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Academic Evaluations

Reports are given to the students at the end of every main lesson when the main lesson books are returned. Quarterly progress reports are posted online for parents in November and April; the semester grades and reports are published in January and June.

Academic Probation

There is a nine week probationary period for all new high school students. In addition, any student may be placed on a nine-week probation if their conduct or academics warrant it.

After School Hours

The school can assume no responsibility for supervision of students before and after school hours, except at regularly scheduled and supervised activities. Students are not permitted inside the buildings without specific faculty permission after school hours.

Attendance & Punctuality

Students are expected to attend school every day for the entire day except for absences due to illness, religious holidays, emergencies, or when an absence has been previously excused by the advisors. An extended vacation is not an excused absence. Absences due to illness or other reasons not previously approved must be telephoned or emailed to the high school office between 8:15am and 9:15am.

Please avoid scheduling such things as medical appointments during the school day. If absences are unavoidable (as in college visits), the students must have approval in advance. Permission to miss school must be obtained well in advance by a request in writing to the high school chairperson. Failure to do so would indicate a lack of support of the philosophy of the school and warrants re-examination of the relationship between the parents and the school.

We want students to develop excellent attendance habits, including arriving on time for main lesson and attending classes on time during the day. Excellent attendance shows a commitment to learning, and is good preparation for meeting responsibilities later in life.

Arrival, Attendance and Tardiness for High School

- The High School doors open at 8:00am.
- Main Lesson begins promptly at 8:20am. Students are expected to be in class by 8:15am.
- Students who enter the classroom after 8:20am are considered late.

- Students who arrive later than 9:00am to main lesson are counted absent for the class, although whenever they arrive, they should proceed to the high school office for a note and then join their class in the classroom.
- The tally of late arrivals is cleared at the end of each semester, and the student begins the next semester with zero ('0') late arrivals.

Timeliness Policy

- After a fourth late arrival to school, students will be assigned a detention, and the parents will be notified. Any additional late arrivals will result in a detention.
- After three late arrivals to any one class after main lesson, students will receive a detention.
- Detentions will be scheduled once/month.
- After three detentions, parents will be asked to meet with the Advisor and the Chair.
- If there is no improvement, a student may be suspended.
- If students are late to the next class because a test goes over time, or because a teacher must speak to a student, etc., the student must bring a note from that teacher to the next class to be excused.

Reporting Absences and Return to School after an Absence

Parents are expected to notify the School of an unexpected absence due to illness or emergency **before school begins** on the morning of the absence.

- Call the High School Office (845-356-2514 x 309) or email hmorgan@gmws.org to report absences. Please speak with Ms. Morgan or leave a message.
- Calls from students will not be accepted.
- Ms. Morgan will follow up any absence not reported by a parent.

Early Dismissals

- Students who need to leave School before the end of the day must bring a note from a parent or have their parent call or email to notify the school of the dismissal time and the reason for the early dismissal.
- Students must sign out on the sign out sheet at the office.
- If a student is ill during the day, parents will be called to allow the student to leave early.
- Please note that the school does not have accommodations for students to rest at school when they are ill. Students who do not feel well enough to be at school must go home.

Dismissal at the End of the Day

- Classes end at 3:00pm when students must complete their school chore. The school day ends at 3:10pm.
- After-school activities will be dismissed by the supervising teachers from the site of the activity.
- Students are expected to leave the building within 30 minutes after dismissal unless they are enrolled in an after-school activity. Students who remain without a supervising teacher will be asked to leave the building.

Leaving School Without Permission from a Parent/Guardian

- If a student needs to leave school for the day, they must first ask their advisors to sign them out in the front office.
- If a student leaves school, or skips any classes, without permission from Ms. Morgan or an advisor, disciplinary action will follow, including loss of privileges, possible suspension and/or expulsion.

Attendance, Credit and Make-Up of Work

In the high school, absences for any reason may adversely affect a student's credit. Given the schedule of classes and the curriculum demands, it is difficult to make up missed class and classwork.

- If a quarter or more of a Main Lesson is missed, the student will not receive credit for that Main Lesson unless arrangements are made with the individual teacher to make up work for credit. This would then be recorded on the student's record as NC.
- If a student misses more than ten days of a class, the student will not receive credit for that quarter unless arrangements are made with the individual teacher to make up work for credit. This would then be recorded on the student's record as NC.
- If a student earns a grade of NC for two Main Lessons, the student will be placed on Academic Probation. Consequences could include: evaluation, suspension, or expulsion.
- Students must be present for the final tests at the end of a Main Lesson, orchestra/band and chorus concerts, and eurythmy and play performances. A doctor's note may be necessary to make up the exam/performance.
- A course may not remain INCOMPLETE on a student's transcript. A grade must be assigned by the end of the final marking period of the year.

Excessive Absences

- The school is responsible for making sure that students attend school regularly and on time.
- The school reserves the right to determine if the student has a legitimate excuse for being absent.
- After 15 days of cumulative absence, a high school student's record of attendance will be brought to the high school faculty for an evaluation and review.
- Excessive absences or lateness may lead to disciplinary action, including dismissal.
- Any absentee record of 20% or more of the school year without a medical exemption may be reported to New York City Social Services for truancy concerns.

Emergency Absences

The school expects all families to plan their year around the school calendar. When an emergency requires a student to be absent, parents must contact the school in one of the following ways: call or email the advisors and Ms. Morgan to inform the school about the emergency and the estimated number of days absent.

Planned Absences

- The school expects all families to plan their year around the school calendar.
- When a student must be absent for unavoidable obligations, the parents must notify the advisors and Ms. Morgan at least two weeks in advance of the absence to request any accommodation for missed work.
- The faculty will set conditions for missed work, and the family can plan accordingly. It may not be possible to arrange to make up work, including quizzes, tests or labs.
- The faculty will not excuse extra vacation or personal days other than college visits.
- Absences for religious observances are considered planned absences. Please contact your child's advisors to plan the absence.

Leaving Early

Students who leave before the end of the school day are expected to obtain parental permission in advance. A parent can do one of the following:

- come in and sign the student out in person
- send a note with the student

- email the high school office
- call the office

Students may not leave without signing out in the high school office, even with parental permission to leave.

Absence From Curricular Events, Final Exams, Plays & Eurythmy Performances

Students are expected to participate in scheduled orchestra, band and choral concerts which are part of their coursework. Students are expected to take final exams on the day they are given. Unexcused absence from such events may impact the grade. Illness verified by a note from a doctor, family emergencies, and religious observance will be considered excused absences. Absence due to conflict with other events is not considered an excused absence.

Care Room

Students may ask permission to be excused from class due to potential illness and must get a PASS from the teacher or Ms. Morgan to go to the Care Room. During snack and lunch students can get a pass from Ms. Morgan. You must have a PASS to go to the Care Room. Basic medical supplies (Band-aids, arnica, etc.) are kept in a basket in the closet in the hall near Ms. Monteleone's office. You are free to help yourself.

Cell Phones and Electronic Devices

Students may not use their cell phones or other devices between the hours of 8am and 3:10pm. Students will turn off their phones and deposit them in the cell phone case as they enter the main lesson classroom. Phones will be kept safe in the office until 3:10pm. They must complete their after-school jobs before using their phones. Students may not carry cell phones during the school day. If a student needs to make a phone call during the school day, he or she may ask a teacher to use an office phone (not the high school office phone). If a cell phone is seen or heard, the phone will be given to one of the class advisors, and the consequences will be as follows:

- First offense – Parents may pick up phones from the class advisor at the end of the day. At this time they will be reminded of the consequences for repeat offenses.
- Repeat offenses – The student will serve an in-school suspension. Parents may pick up the cell phone from the class advisor at the end of the day.

When students are using their phones after school hours, they should refrain from using them outside. The Upstairs Language room (formerly the Science room) is designated for after school cell phone use.

Class Trips

Excursions and trips supplement every student's education at Green Meadow. Whether a class takes a week-long outing to Hermit Island, Maine, a weekend ski trip, or a visit to a New York City museum during the school day, parents will receive ample notice. Permission slips valid for the entire school year are sent home during the summer and must be on file by the start of the school. The cost of such trips will vary according to the nature of the activity. Please contact the high school chair if the cost is a hardship for your family.

Communication

The school depends upon the parents to attend parent meetings. The dates of these are announced in the "7 Days" and on the website calendar. In addition, the Bulletin contains articles of interest to all parents as well as announcements of coming events and, from time to time, student work as well. The Bulletin is published bi-monthly, on paper and electronically. The "7 Days" is emailed to parents on Sundays with information about activities in the upcoming week.

Community Service

- Ninth graders will perform community service activities as arranged during the school year by their advisors. In addition, they are required to perform five hours of in-school service during the year.
- Tenth and eleventh graders are required to serve fifteen hours of community service each year outside of school, as well as five hours of in-school service.
- Seniors are required to serve five hours of in-school service. Students entering 12th grade must show proof that their 30 hours of outside community service (required in 10th & 11th grade) has been completed.

Students are strongly encouraged to serve their communities outside of this neighborhood.

Documentation of work done, including the date(s), number of hours served, and a brief description of work performed, on letterhead if possible, and signed by the supervisor, should be submitted to Ms. Morgan so that credit can be given. Your advisors will be happy to help you think of ways to serve your community. If you serve more than the required hours, be sure to turn in all the documentation, so that you have a complete record for your college application process.

Computers

Computers in the high school are available for student use. The computers

are there only for curricular purposes, which include classes in typing, digital photography, graphic design, research and computer programming. In addition, high school students may use laptops for functions relating to the life of the school community. Misuse may lead to the loss of privileges for an individual or the whole student body.

Dance Policy

Students are encouraged to organize recreational activities such as dances, which can enrich the social fabric of student life. Guidelines for dances and similar events are the following:

- No drinking, no drugs, no inappropriate dancing.
- At least three chaperones are needed for a dance.
- No student may leave the visible vicinity of the event and then return to the event.
- Eighth graders will only be invited to a high school event or dance with the class teacher's permission and with a lower school teacher as one of the chaperones.
- The high school dances are for students currently enrolled at GMWS. Guests may only be invited with chaperone/advisor approval in advance.

Disciplinary Procedures

Expectations

The high school faculty anticipates the cooperation of the students in order to provide a healthy social environment in an educational setting.

The faculty does not desire to police students. We encourage and rely on the students' own motivation to cooperate in fostering a productive school environment. We are convinced that this cooperation will help the students develop a sense of social responsibility and responsibility to their inner moral convictions. When this inner authority fails, the life of the school suffers, and the resulting difficulty will be resolved by the faculty in conjunction with the student and his or her parents.

The high school faculty assumes that students intend to do their best in all areas of school life. The atmosphere most conducive to learning can only be achieved with parents and students who willingly support the philosophy, policies, and values of the school. The faculty expects high standards of behavior, citizenship, and care for others from all students, without the burden of a large number of specific rules. This includes appropriate language between students as well as with teachers. **Consequently, the faculty reserves the right to judge the seriousness of impropriety of**

behavior during school. Rarely are students involved in anything but minor infractions, which are handled by the teachers, guidance counselor, and class advisors in a manner appropriate to the offense.

Students should be aware of the fact that backpacks and instruments found in the hall, in the common room or blocking access to rooms, may be confiscated, redeemable from the high school office for a nominal fee of \$1.00.

Send Outs

If a student is told to leave a high school class, he or she is expected to report to the high school office, unless the teacher gives other instructions. The send-out is recorded in a book. At the second send-out the advisors are informed, and action is taken which the advisors deem appropriate.

Suspensions

The student is required to miss one or more school days (as determined by the advisors). A meeting is held with the student, parents and advisors prior to the student's reentry to school. Students are suspended for the following reasons:

- Smoking or vaping on Green Meadow campus at any time.
- Smoking or vaping on Threefold property between 7:30am and 4pm. Seniors who are off-campus during their lunch period are not permitted to smoke.
- Being dishonest, including lying, stealing, cheating and plagiarizing.
- Bullying or harassing
- Vandalizing school property or pranking.
- Failing to attend a scheduled class, assembly or other high school event without first obtaining permission to miss the class or event.
- Being present in the buildings after hours without supervision or permission.
- Not reporting directly to the high school office after being sent out.

In-school suspension

Some infractions may result in in-school suspensions at the discretion of the faculty. For an in-school suspension, students come to school from 8:20 to 3pm, and perform tasks given to them by faculty and staff members.

Expulsion

The school reserves the right to expel any student under the following circumstances:

- When the terms of the student's probation are not met.

- The student is deemed to be not academically suited to the curriculum of the school.
- A student's behavior is determined to be destructive to the life of the school or his or her behavior demonstrates that the student does not willingly abide by the few rules we have.

Dress Code

We expect all students to dress in a manner which reflects our commitment to learning. Clothing should be neat and comfortable, and be appropriate for the classes of the day. Students should be covered from upper chest to mid-thigh. Students must wear shoes. Students should refrain from wearing clothing which promotes brands or sends messages. Teachers reserve the right to determine what is appropriate school clothing. The dress code applies to field trips unless otherwise indicated by chaperones.

Gym Class

Students receive a tee shirt to wear in gym class, which they may not alter. They need to provide their own proper athletic shoes and shorts or warm-up pants. There is a charge if the tee shirt needs to be replaced.

Assembly Dress required for School Assemblies

Students should wear solid colored pants or skirts, and dress shirts or dresses. No tee shirts or casual wear are acceptable for assemblies.

Concert Dress

Concert attire for everyone is all black including socks and dress shoes. Dresses and shirts should have long or short sleeves (not sleeveless) and should be mid-calf length or longer.

Dress Code Violation Consequences:

If a student is repeatedly out of dress code he or she will be asked to meet with advisors to determine the next steps.

Drug and Alcohol Policy

In healthy adolescent development, a young person's physical well-being, social and emotional awareness, and active thinking are all interrelated. Waldorf education can be effective only when all of these qualities are nurtured. Drugs and alcohol inhibit healthy development, and work against the teachers' efforts to cultivate the developing being of the young person. For adolescents especially, these substances are physically debilitating, socially destructive, and damaging to the subtle process of perception and thought.

We are primarily concerned with the health and education of the young people in our care. We expect that each student will make an inner commitment to abstain from drugs and alcohol, and that parents will support us in this effort. We wish to help any student who voluntarily discloses a problem of substance abuse.

Students who use, deal, or are under the influence of drugs or alcohol on school grounds or at any school-related event (such as sporting events or the prom) will be subject to the following consequences:

A first offense will necessitate a meeting between the student, the parents and selected faculty. At this meeting, it will be determined whether the student will be expelled or asked to participate in a counseling or rehabilitation program, which may include a requirement for periodic drug testing. Only if the student agrees to such a program can there be a basis for his or her continued enrollment at Green Meadow Waldorf School. A further offense may result in immediate expulsion.

If faculty members observe a convergence of indicators such as excessive tardiness, fatigue in class, inability to concentrate, a downturn in academic performance, etc., a meeting will be arranged with the student to discuss possible causes and the student may be asked to have an outside evaluation. If it is determined that the student is struggling with substance abuse and the situation cannot be resolved to the satisfaction of the faculty, he or she may be asked to leave.

Students who wish to contest a drug or alcohol disciplinary action may bring their case before a specially designated faculty group. This group will make a recommendation to the high school faculty, which will make the final decision.

Reminder to parents: it is illegal to serve alcohol to minors. Parents are liable for alcohol served in their homes by anyone.

Exchange Program

Students in grades 10 and 11 have the possibility of an exchange with a Waldorf student in a foreign country. The exchange coordinator will give a presentation on the exchange program to ninth graders and to their parents. We have found the foreign exchange program to be of benefit to the individuals and to the school, and we encourage students in good standing to take advantage of it if possible.

Students wishing to take part in this program must apply to the language department for permission.

International students at GMWS are expected to take English as a New Language classes.

Extra-Curricular Activities

All students may participate in extra-curricular activities. Ninth graders will be monitored to make sure that extra-curricular activities are not interfering with the establishment of good study habits and acclimatization to the increased high school workload. Green Meadow offers activities such as a drama club, robotics, literary magazine, yearbook, Student Council, musical groups, and the Community Service group; others may appear by student request. The offerings change from year to year. Conditions for non-athletic after-school activities will be determined on a year to year basis. Check with teacher in charge of the activity or club.

Graduation

The high school commencement is planned and hosted by the school. The senior class advisors choose the commencement speaker. Class parents coordinate details with the advisors.

Guidance/School Counseling

The counseling program aims to help each student formulate appropriate post-secondary plans. The majority of students go on to college, but others are assisted in finding work or other vocational training.

The counselor works with juniors early in the year to help them become aware of their particular abilities and interests, and how they relate to future work and study. Meetings between the counselor and parents deal mainly with the college application, College Board testing, and financial aid process.

The counselor welcomes questions from students and parents, and is happy to make appointments with parents at any time during a student's career in the high school.

Harassment

We expect that we will treat one another in a respectful and considerate manner. Green Meadow does not tolerate bullying, teasing or intimidation of any kind. If you are not sure if someone's language or behavior is unacceptable, but it makes you (or someone else) uncomfortable, talk to the guidance counselor. Any unwelcome or socially inappropriate behavior should be reported immediately to the guidance counselor or the High School Chair for further action. Please see the GMWS Non-discrimination and anti-harassment policy in the Parent Handbook and Community Directory.

Incidental Expenses

Incidental expenses occur through the year, for such things as field trips, class trips, social events, High School Week, etc. We try to keep the costs to minimum. We also make every effort to give ample advance warning.

Lunch

High school students may bring lunches and snacks, or buy them at the Hungry Hollow Co-op, Threefold Café or Harvest Moon during lunch time. Lunch times are very busy at the Co-op and students are asked to be considerate of the other customers. Students are not permitted to walk along Chestnut Ridge Road.

Students are asked to restrict on-campus eating to the Common Room, faculty-designated areas, and the picnic areas outside the High School. Students should not be loitering in the halls or on the front steps, since that is distracting to the classes in progress. Students are responsible for keeping the eating areas in all these places clean. Students who are found to be irresponsible in any way may lose their off-campus lunch privileges.

Media Policy

Green Meadow Waldorf School is dedicated to nurturing capacities for imagination, healthy feeling, independent thinking, and active willing. We recognize the debilitating effects that media, including television, movies, social networking and video games, can have on the development of these capacities. High school students are strongly discouraged from engaging in these activities during the school week.

Music Lessons

All students (with the exception of foreign exchange students) are required to play in either the high school orchestra or band. In order to maintain an effective program, all students are required to take private lessons on the musical instrument they play in their school ensemble.

As a convenience to parents and students, the school has gathered a distinguished group of instrumentalists to give individual lessons during and after school. While parents pay for these lessons, the school does feel responsible to see that the teachers' time is well used. To this end, the following suggestions are made:

If a student does not show up for a scheduled lesson, or comes late to the lesson, the parent is still expected to pay for the teacher's time. Necessary cancellations should be made as soon as possible to help facilitate the teacher's schedule. Please do not call the school; contact the teacher directly.

Regular practice at home is the only way to make progress on an instrument. Parents are asked to make sure that students practice consistently. Be aware of scheduled orchestra and band periods. Students are, needless to say, required to have their instruments in school on those days.

Requests concerning changes of instrument or private lesson teacher should be directed in writing to the Music Committee. Following a discussion with their private teachers, seniors are allowed to discontinue lessons after the Music Panels of their senior year.

Students may also choose to study with a qualified teacher of their choice outside of school. Failure to take private lessons will impact the band or orchestra grade. Students in need of financial assistance can contact the business office to apply for a scholarship.

Off-Campus Privileges

Students may not leave the campus, go home or drive without staff or faculty permission. Students are given permission to go to the Threefold Café, Harvest Moon or the Co-op during their lunch period only; students may not go to the Co-op or Café at snack. Only seniors may walk to Da Vinci's, American Bulldog, or Hot Bagels. Advisors will suspend the off-campus privileges of anyone abusing these rules.

Parking

Students may not park on the Green Meadow campus or at the Co-op. Violators will have their vehicles towed away at their expense. Students are permitted to park behind Holder House.

Students are not permitted to drive or be in cars during the school day. Students must obey posted speed limit signs, and behave respectfully toward other drivers and pedestrians in and around the parking lots.

Plagiarism

Plagiarism and cheating will not be tolerated. If a student is found to have presented words or ideas as his or her own without attribution, or to have cheated on a test, he or she will be suspended. The offense will be noted in our records and the student will receive a failing grade for the test or assignment. A second offense will be cause for teachers to consider academic probation or expulsion.

PSAT, S.A.T. & ACT

The PSAT/MNSQT is offered at Green Meadow in October every year to sophomores and juniors. A program is available at Green Meadow for juniors and seniors wishing to prepare for the S.A.T. and ACT exams. The guidance counselor informs the students when the course is being offered. The fee is payable directly to the independent program.

School Hours

The building and offices are open from 8:00am to 3:30pm on school days. The school day begins at 8:15am and ends at 3:10pm with the completion of the after-school cleanup job. Students are expected to be out of the building by 3:40pm.

Snow and other Weather Related Closings

Due to school bus transportation, Green Meadow will follow the lead of the East Ramapo School District. We have an automated calling system which will be activated in the case of a change to our normal schedule. You can also:

Sports

Beginning in grade seven, students may participate in extra-curricular athletics activities such as cross country, basketball, volleyball, soccer and baseball/softball. Tennis is sometimes offered. There is an equestrian program starting in grade one. The number of games or matches will vary from sport to sport but should not exceed three scheduled contests per week. Tournaments may fall during a weekend or over a holiday.

Conduct

Since Green Meadow athletes represent the school, it is vital that they conduct themselves responsibly. They are expected to be prompt and prepared for games. They must obey the rules. Swearing at or criticizing the coaches, other players, or the referees are considered breaches of sportsmanlike conduct. Fighting is an even more serious breach of conduct and will result in expulsion from the game and suspension from at least one game following. Players are asked to sign a contract agreeing to training conditions on which their participation is contingent. Each athlete is required to sign a pledge to abstain from any use of drugs, alcohol or tobacco.

Insurance

All participants in interscholastic sports must have a current physical examination within the previous twelve months before the beginning of a season. For each sport a student plays, a fee is charged to cover coaching, refereeing, equipment, and transportation expenses.

Players may not drive to and from games without the specific written permission of their parents and coach ahead of time. Faculty members may drive team members in faculty vehicles. Team members must return to school after each game before going elsewhere.

Practices

In any season, practices will take place no more than four times per week. The days will be determined by prior agreement reached by the coaches and the teachers responsible for other extra-curricular activities. Players are expected to come to practice unless absent, ill or injured.

Times of practices will vary depending on the sport. No practices will take place without the direct supervision of a coach.

Student Participation

Students who leave school early due to an illness may not participate in extra curricular activities on that day. If a student feels ill, he or she should receive parent or teacher permission to go home. If a student is absent from school due to illness he or she is not allowed to participate in extra-curricular activities on that day. Chronic lateness to school will imperil student participation in the extra-curricular activities.

Teacher Absences

If the teacher of a class is absent or detained, students are expected to remain in the classroom until further instructions have been given. If no teacher shows up after ten minutes, students should send a representative to the high school office to find out what the situation is. Failure to show up in the classroom unless otherwise directed will be considered skipping class. Look for notices on the student board about teacher absences and changes of schedule.

Telephone Messages

The high school number is 845-356-2514, x309. We must request that you not ask staff members to relay any messages to the students except in cases of real emergencies.
